JUBILEE TRUST

A cursory study of the history of the Convent School on top of the hill in Durban North will reveal that from its humble beginnings in 1954, the school has reached heights and garnered a reputation that its founders could hardly have imagined. From its establishment as a school for young girls (and boys in the junior classes) in the fledgling suburb of Durban North looking for a Catholic-based education, the school has faced and overcome a number of challenges to its existence.

For the first few decades enrolment numbers were a concern — could we remain viable? Some old girls will remember having to join forces with Oakford Priory to compete as Combined Convent in the D Section of the D&D Swimming gala. The government of the day and its apartheid policies also posed a challenge to the school, which was one of the first to open its doors to children of colour. Did you know that the decision to build the swimming pool was in response to the municipality not allowing non-white learners to swim at the Durban North Baths which the school used for swimming lessons and galas?

The last years of the previous century and the first of this one saw the opening of a number of private schools in the north Durban area, again posing a threat to Fatima's existence. Fortunately, the Newcastle Dominican Sisters and leaders of the school did not panic and, by staying true to its founding intent of providing affordable, quality education rooted in Christian values, the school continues to exist. But we do more than exist. Indeed a case can be made that the school has flourished in the face of growing competition. Today, our learners compete on the national academic, cultural and sporting stages and it would not be an understatement to say that Our Lady of Fatima is regarded as one of the premier schools of its kind in South Africa today. To help to continue the legacy, we need your support.

In terms of its Trust Deed, the Jubilee Trust has as its main objective, to receive donations, allocations, bequests and similar receipts for purposes of promoting the objectives as indicated below:

oThe attraction and retention of staff and learners who meet the agreed criteria oThe development of infrastructure and buildings oThe provision and upgrading of technology, resources and equipment.

From the outset it was anticipated that parents, alumni and supporters of the school would be the main contributors to the Trust. To make the Trust attractive to donors, the vehicle itself is registered in such a way that contributions can be tax deductible in the hands of individual or corporate donors in addition to qualifying for corporate SED spend criteria. The Trust itself is independent from the school and is administered by a Board of Trustees together with a professional trustee. This ensures that the appropriate governance is in place and that objective decisions are made regarding the nature and essence of any funding.

Since 2014 the Trust has made a significant contribution to the success, including the transformation, of the school. Building on the proud record of its first seventy years and the momentum generated in recent years is critical if the school is to prevail in a fast-changing world, and we would like the Jubilee Trust to play its part in ensuring continued success.
